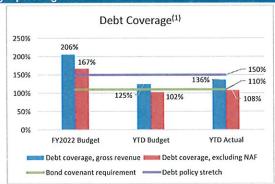

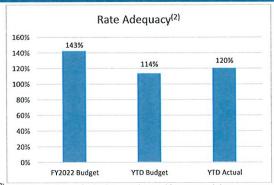

RESOLUTION

Lower Reedy Odor Control Improvements State Revolving Fund

WHEREAS, the State Water Quality Revolving Fund Authority (the "State Authority") provides low-interest loan financing for the construction of publicly-owned wastewater treatment facilities from the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (the "Fund") pursuant to the Federal Clean Water Act and Title 48, Chapter 5, Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended; and

WHEREAS, Renewable Water Resources ("ReWa") is a legally constituted special purpose district in the State of South Carolina and is authorized to incur revenue debt pursuant to Title 6, Chapter 17, Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended; and

WHEREAS, ReWa has determined that it is in its best interests to apply to the State Authority for a loan from the Fund;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Renewable Water Resources Commission (the "Commission") the governing body of ReWa, in a meeting duly assembled:

- 1. That the Commission hereby authorizes the Chief Executive Officer to complete, and the Chairman of the Commission to execute and submit an application to the State Authority for a loan from the Fund in the amount of approximately \$9,254,000 to finance the costs of the installation of odor control equipment at the Lower Reedy WRRF as further described in the application to the State Authority. The Chief Executive Officer is authorized to take such actions as may be necessary or convenient to complete the application process.
- 2. That ReWa will grant to the State Authority a pledge of and lien upon certain revenues of ReWa's sewer system for repayment of the loan.
- 3. That the final terms and conditions of the loan and the loan documents shall be subject to the approval of this Commission.

The above Resolution, upon motion duly made, was passed and approved by the Commission at their regular meeting held on the 25th day of July 2022.

SUBJECT: Amendment to ReWa and LCWSC Service Agreement

Renewable Water Resources (ReWa) and the Laurens County Water and Sewer Commission (LCWSC) executed an Agreement on June 2, 2017, agreeing that "flow from these Projects is delivered to ReWa for transportation and treatment."

Agreement Term 1 denotes: "no further...Projects ...will be accepted..., except by amendment to this Agreement."

Therefore, LCWSC has requested an Amendment to the Agreement seeking transportation and treatment service for the following four Projects:

- TMS: 189-05-00-029 aka Cardinal Ridge Subdivision (54 acres)
- TMS: 189-00-00-034 aka Wren Woods Subdivision (55 acres)
- TMS: 221-00-00-004 (60 acres)
- The current corporate limits of the Town of Gray Court with a flow up to 70,000 gpd

Staff has reviewed ReWa's available capacity in the associated transportation (trunk) line and treatment plant (Durbin) to handle this request and find it adequate.

Legal counsel for ReWa and LCWSC collectively developed the following Amendment to the Agreement.

Staff recommends the Board authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute an Amendment to the June 2, 2017, Agreement, thereby allowing ReWa to accept the flow from four Projects in LCWSC service area.

This Amendment to Agreement is made this ____ day of ______, 2022, between Renewable Water Resources (ReWa) and the Laurens County Water and Sewer Commission (LCWSC), public entities and political subdivisions of the State of South Carolina. As used herein, the term "Parties" shall refer collectively to ReWa and LCWSC; and the term "Party" shall refer separately to either ReWa or LCWSC.

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, ReWa and LCWSC entered into an Agreement dated June 2, 2017 pursuant to which ReWa agreed, among other things, to provide wastewater collection, treatment and disposal services to the proposed Mogul pump station service area as described in such Agreement, subject to the Regulations (as defined therein), provided ReWa is paid its charges, rates and fees for such wastewater services; and

WHEREAS, ReWa and LCWSC now wish to enter into this Amendment in order to add to the areas listed in Paragraph 2 to the Agreement where ReWa will provide wastewater collection, treatment and disposal services.

WITNESSETH:

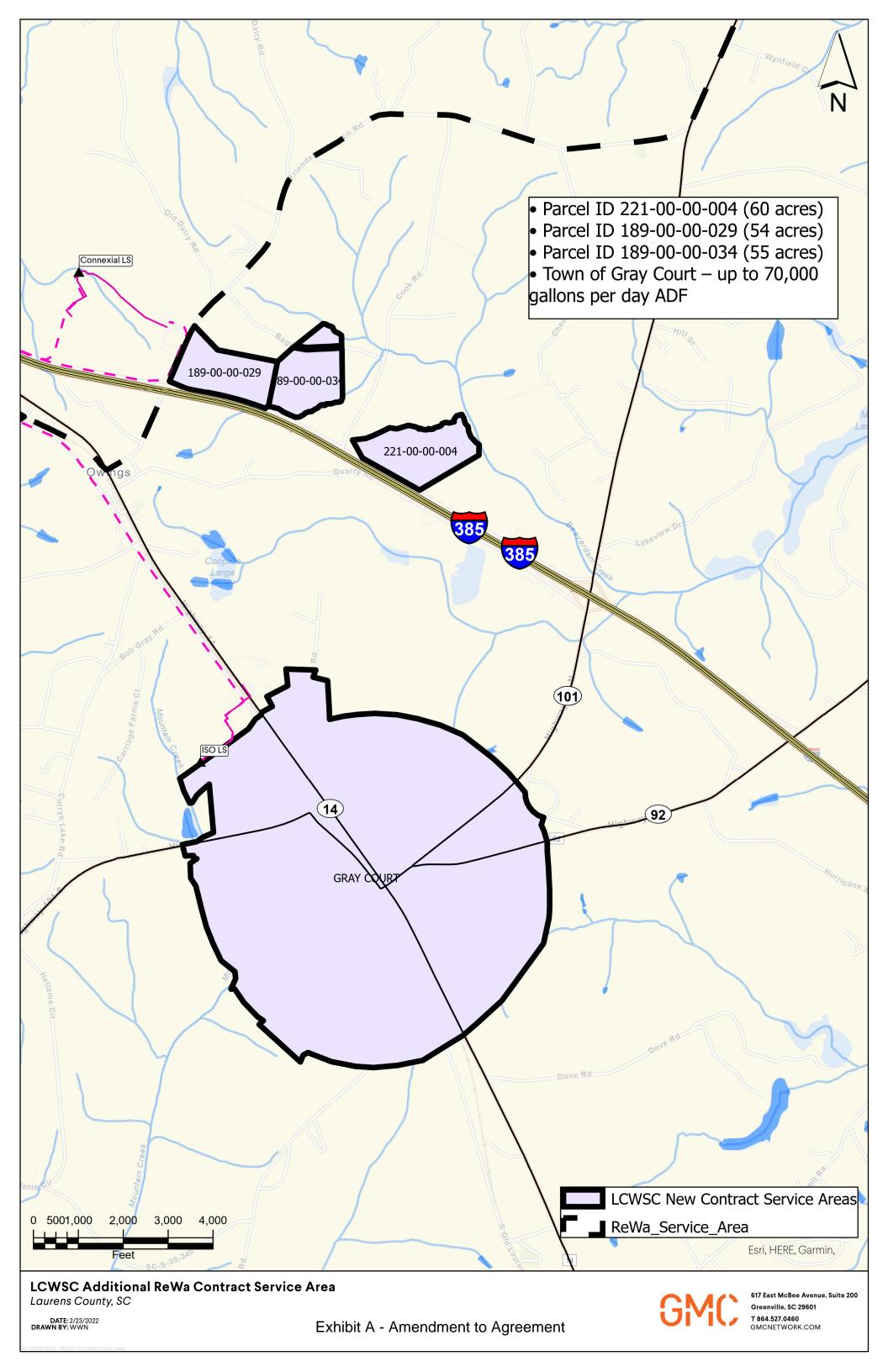
NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits to the Parties, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows.

1. <u>Amendment.</u> Paragraph 2 to the Agreement is hereby amended to add that ReWa
shall also provide service outside its current service area as described below and as shown on
Exhibit A, such parcels to be served shall include the following.

- Tax Map Number 189-05-00-029 Cardinal Ridge Subdivision.
- Tax Map Numbers 189-00-00-034 Wren Woods Subdivision
- Tax Map Numbers 221-00-00-004 -
- The current corporate limits of the Town of Gray Court.
- 2. <u>Republication and Reaffirmation.</u> Except as provided herein above, all of the other terms, covenants and provisions of the Agreement are hereby republished and reaffirmed by the Parties the same as if set forth verbatim herein.

SUBJECT: Piedmont Private Property Inflow and Infiltration Pilot Project Construction

Contract Award

As part of the Wet Weather Program and its efforts to remove excess inflow and infiltration (I/I) from the system, Brown and Caldwell has recommended an evaluation of private property service laterals in the Piedmont service area. This evaluation will determine the amount of inflow and infiltration reduction potential on private property. ReWa has signed up, to date, 120 participants for this project. If the condition of the lateral is poor, the lateral will be rehabilitated with cured-in-place pipe. This pilot project will give insight on whether public lateral rehabilitation is a cost-effective method to reduce inflow and infiltration.
